INTRODUCTION

The program of the English Language Entrance Examination (writing test) for foreign citizens and stateless persons who plan further study at the Private higher educational institution "Kyiv Medical University" aimed at obtaining the master's degree in the field of science 22 "Health care" majors 221 Dentistry, 222 Medicine and 226 Pharmacy, industrial pharmacy designed concerning the content and scope of basic curricula and requirements for the graduates of general secondary education level.

In future profession the English language provides doctor's literacy and international terminology understanding between experts. English is the main source of development and renovation of terminological systems of different fields, including pharmacy, dentistry and medicine.

The proposed English language entrance exam program was created according to the main criteria of the State Standard as to the complete secondary education and of the European recommendations as to the foreign language level (level B1).

The program is designed for PHEE «Kyiv Medical University» applicants based on a complete general secondary education.

The program was discussed and approved at the meeting of the Admissions of PHEE «Kyiv Medical University» (Record No. g of 30 03, 2023).

PROGRAM CONTENT

The program had been elaborated in accordance with the goals and objectives that determine the competencies of foreign applicants at different levels of mastering the English language of further training, and test the level of knowledge, practical skills and abilities sufficient for effective first -year training, and most importantly, the level of foreign language communicative competence.

1. THE GOAL AND OBJECTIVES OF THE EXAM

The goal of assessment of the English language: to evaluate the degree of preparedness of international applicants in the English language for the purpose of competitive selection for study at PHEE «Kyiv Medical University».

The main goal of the program is to receive an objective and warranted evaluation of English proficiency of the potential enrollees applying to PHEE «Kyiv Medical University».

The applicant should demonstrate:

- 1) the ability to carry out academic activities and communicate in educational, professional and socio-cultural environment;
- 2) the practical command of the language to study in the English media in accordance with the medical-biological profile of training;
- 3) use of written language within the framework of everyday communication and general scientific subjects;
- 4) the mental and factual preparation to perceive information in the chosen language of training.

Practical knowledge of spoken and scientific language and at the same time, ability to outline their clear difference demonstrates linguistic competence of the applicant, the degree of mastering the English language as a language of further training at the medical university.

The following is required:

- to determine the applicant's ability to implement knowledge of the basics of lexical grammatical, syntactic, word-forming system of Scientific English;
- to test skills of search and processing of information, above all, professionally oriented one;
- to determine the applicant's level of preparation for the tasks of different levels of complexity in the English language;
- evaluate the amount and quality of work performed per unit of time using the presented criteria;
- to provide a reasoned review about the degree of preparation of the foreign applicant for further study.

2. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR APPLICANTS

An entrance examination aims to test and assess knowledge of English as a system (phonetics, grammar, vocabulary, and spelling).

At the English language entrance examination applicant should:

- have basic speech skills gained during schooling and successfully apply them in the proposed communication situations;
- understand original English texts of various genres and styles;
- adequately use vocabulary and grammar of modern English communication according to the given situation and appropriate style;
- be able to transmit his/her own point of view, attitude, and personal feelings and make conclusions in English;
- have clear, understandable, legible oral speech with an effective logical structure;

- use idiomatic expressions and phrasal verbs. Correctly transmit different connotations and apply wide range of speech samples;
- know English equivalents of medical and clinical terminology and lexical material of human body, various anatomical structures, which enables to understand classes and use English vocabulary during studies.

3. LANGUAGE COMPETENCE REQUIREMENTS

Language competence requirements include:

Morphology

Noun. Nouns: singular and plural. Nouns as adjectives. Possessive Nouns.

Article. Indefinite and definite articles. Zero articles.

Adjective. Types of adjectives. Degrees of comparison of adjectives.

Pronoun. Types of pronouns.

Simple, Continuous and Perfect tenses, Active and passive Voice.

Conditional sentences (0, I, II, III types). The imperative mood of the verb.

Impersonal verb forms. Gerund. Modal verbs. Frequently used phrasal verbs.

The structure "be going to".

Adverb. Function and distribution. Types of Adverbs. Derivation. Inflection.

Adjective modifiers (intensifiers). Degrees of comparison of adverbs.

Numeral. Numbers and Numerals. Functions of numerals. Digits, figures, numerals, numbers. Cardinal numerals. Ordinal numerals. Fractions. Decimal

fractions.

Preposition. Types of prepositions. Use of prepositions.

Particle. Its use with verbs.

Conjunctions. Conjunctions, connecting words and fillers in English sentences.

Coordinating Conjunctions. Subordinating Conjunctions. Conjunctive Adverbs,

Principal parts of the sentence.

Subordinate parts of the sentence

Simple sentence. Types of simple sentences according to the emotional colouring.

Declarative sentences.

LEXICIAL MINIMUM (2500 words)

The lexical minimum of an applicant should consist of at least 2500 units, in accordance with the subject of situational communication provided by the English Language Syllabus.

4. THE STRUCTURE OF THE TEST

The test assignment includes 2 types of tasks from all sections of the discipline. The answers require a deep knowledge of the English language in the amount specified by the program of the secondary school, the ability to express thoughts in the English language logically and to assess phenomena.

The each task has its own level of difficulty and evaluation by a certain number of points. When assessing, a 200-point scale is used in Table 1. Enrollees will be given an exam consisting of a 2- part writing test demonstrating their grammar and lexical skills.

Part I.

A multiple choice task. Grammar test. Minimum Level of difficulty. Applicants have to read a task and fill the gaps with the correct variant. Task time is 60 minutes. The maximum grade is 120 points. There are 60 questions. Each question is multiple-choice, oriented to demonstrate proper usage of words and grammar material. The multiple-choice questions have only one correct answer. One correct answer is 2 points.

Part II.

Comprehension task. Medium level of difficulty. The maximum grade is 80 points. There are 20 questions. Each question is multiple-choice and contains some considerations, sometimes false, but only one is correct. The task gives an opportunity to evaluate the candidate's quality of processing the text array, the ability analyze it. One correct answer is 4 points. Task time is 30 minutes.

The evaluation system is presented in Table 1.

5. ASSESSMENT CRITERIA

The assessment of the applicants' level and quality of knowledge will be carried out at 200-point system. Each task is assessed with a certain number of points. The final score according to the 200-point system is assigned according to the amount of points for all the tasks.

The maximum amount of points - 200.

The minimum amount of points -120.

The total examination time is 1 hour and 30 minutes.

The entrance examinations are carried out on the basis of the entrance examination programs in accordance with the established schedules published on the official web-site of the University.
